Full description of the course:	The aim of the course is to consolidate the knowledge of English grammatical structures, vocabulary, collocations and idiomatic expressions as well as to encourage students to develop the habit of error analysis and self-correction (to raise the students' awareness of linguistic correctness). In the conversation class students become acquainted with vocabulary from a number of lexical fields and codes of verbal behaviour peculiar to English speaking countries. The class aims to improve students' communication skills by creating a conducive milieu for the expression					
	of their opinions and the participation in spontaneous verbal exchanges on a wide range of topics; the class is also oriented towards refining students' speaking skills.					
	In the writing class care is taken to that students learn how to avoid committing plagiarism and, more generally, how to put their ideas in a clear and lucid way in writing.					
	At this stage emphasis is laid upon acquainting the students with aspects of academic writing to help them towards producing a B.A. thesis. In the reading class care is taken to expose the students to a wide range of original texts (drawn from different cultural backgrounds): from literary texts (fiction in excerpts, stories), through media texts to specialized discourse texts (economics, law or ecology). Finally, students are equipped with strategies for taking higher-level foreign language examinations (including strategies for the selection of the correct answer following a close reading of a text).					
Methods:	Explanation of the theory by the teacher In-class tasks performed under the supervision of the teacher and individual home study, including additional tasks, composition writing and consolidating and building upon theoretical issues introduced in class.
