Skills: Students acquire historical knowledge which helps them shape humanistic formation. It helps them understand, draw appropriate conclusions and explain consequences of historical events. It will help them understand the present and enable them to have a basic discussion about historical and contemporary topics. Students will be able to apply their knowledge in a practical way in their further studies or during their stay abroad i.e. in conversations, visiting historical places, monuments and museums. Students may also share their knowledge with the others and help them understand causes and effects of the past events on contemporary life: the law, customs and tradition. The completion of the course should equip the student with necessary historical knowledge which will be valuable in itself. It could also be applied in further studies, at work and in private life i.e. during their stay in the USA and Great Britain. The history course will also help the students gain basic knowledge of historical terminology. | | | | | |

| Full description of the course: Methods: | Social competence: Students make practical use of their historical knowledge: they develop their interests, follow the course of events in the USA and Great Britain. They can also act as advisors, intermediaries and interpreters for the Poles living in English—speaking countries. The history of the USA and Great Britain is presented chronologically. The events which are important for the nation and for the history of Europe and the world are discussed in detail. The industrial and technological development as well as colonisation play an important role in the content of the course because of their influence on the role and place of the USA and Great Britain and the growing importance of the English language.
