Learning outcomes:				Knowledge: the knowledge which students acquire comprises all aspects of life in English – speaking countries: political, economical, social and cultural.						

Skills:

Students acquire knowledge of the life in English speaking countries which then can be applied in a practical way. It will enable students to understand different aspects of life in these countries, draw simple conclusions and analyze events and processes which occur in these countries. Students will then be able to apply their knowledge in their further studies and during their stay abroad.

The course aims to provide the students with the knowledge necessary to understand the people who live in these countries, their everyday life, lifestyle and work and ways of spending free time. Then they will be able to apply this knowledge in their further studies, at work, travel and during their stay in English – speaking countries. They also gain basic knowledge of terminology necessary for their future study of literature and culture of English – speaking countries.

Social competence:

The course will enable the students to apply their knowledge in interactions with the citizens of English—speaking countries, adapt to local customs and tradition and understand cultural differences. If they stay longer in English—spacking counties they may develop habits and respect customs which prevail in these country. They will also be able to act as advisors, mediators and interpreters for the Poles who live in these countries.

Full description of the course:

The course consists of two parts. In the first part different aspects of life in Great Britain are discussed - geography, administrative division, political system, parliament, the system of law, executive power, the Monarchy, the relations between the UK and other countries, and the internal relations between the UK countries, a very short presentation of the Commonwealth and Canada and Australia, the economic system, the system of education, highbrow culture and popular culture, everyday life and ethnic minorities. In the second part, which is devoted to the USA, the following issues are discussed: geography, administrative division, political division and division of power, the main documents in the history of the country, the role of the USA in the world, economy, the system of education, popular and highbrow culture, the influence of American culture on the world culture, Indian culture, ethnical problems technological inventions and innovation in the USA, eminent Americans from all walks of life.
