Educational goal: The students become familiar with an outline history of British literature, from the Old English period to the twentieth century. They are able to characterize the subsequent literary periods, discuss the work of major writers and recognize and define literary terms with reference to the analyzed literary texts. Learning outcomes (course-**Knowledge:** related): The student - possesses general knowledge of the development of British literature in historical context; - knows the major writers characteristic of literary periods and phenomena; demonstrates basic knowledge of literary analysis and interpretation, especially with reference to English literary texts; - possesses systematized knowledge of selected issues in British literature and culture. **Skills:** The student - uses literary terms and critical concepts; - interprets literary texts, acknowledging their cultural and social contexts, and the opinions of others; - distinguishes and defines various literary genres and forms of text - searches for information in different kind of sources; prepares notes and writes paragraphs. **Social competences:** The student understands the importance of studying English and literature. Elizabethan period (William Shakespeare) 4. Metaphysical poetry (J. Donne, G. Herbert) 5. The Enlightenment (D. Defoe, J. Swift, A. Pope) 6. Romanticism (W. Blake, W. Wordsworth, P.B. Shelley, G.G. Byron, J. Austen, M. Shelley) 7. Pre-Victorian and Victorian era (Charles Dickens, Charlotte and Emily Brontë) 8. Fin-de-siècle and Modernism (O. Wilde, J. Conrad) 9. 20th century and contemporary fiction (J. Joyce, V. Woolf, G. Orwell, 1984). **Classes:** Detailed discussion of the following literary texts: 1. *Beowulf* (fragments) 2.
